#### **Castle Combe Autumn Classic**

Saturday September 21<sup>st</sup> had an ominous weather forecast - would we have showers & thunder, or not? Members from SpotMog, Mendip and ScrumpyMog descended on the motor racing circuit at Castle Combe for their 2-day Autumn Classic. As it turned out early showers caught out some on their way to the circuit, leading to a number cancelling their visit, however those who did make it were rewarded with a fine day, a dry track (apart from one short shower just before the Ferraris came out for their race) and some excellent racing.

From the Wessex Centre we had Colin & Irene, Pete & Val, Mike Carter & guest and myself, and we were joined by two ex members who some of you may know - Pete & Francis See. In total there were 12 Morgans who made it, down from the original 22 that were booked in. Mike Carter even brought his kettle and gas ring so soon after arriving was brewing his first cup of tea!



Around us were a large number of car clubs so we were able to view Lotus 7s and Caterham 7s, Ford GT40s, Jaguars, MGs, etc. Next to where we were parked was the large marquee housing cars that were to be auctioned off from 2pm - one of which was a rather tired looking, one owner, 1994 dark green Plus 8 Morgan with 81380 miles on the clock, which went for £17000.

I had never been to Castle Combe before and was pleasantly surprised to find that I could wander anywhere in and around the paddock, which enabled me to get close up to the cars being prepared and to chat to the owners & drivers. A wide range of race cars included Minis, Ferraris, Jaguars, Formula 3, and a selection of older classics within the GT & Sports Car category including 5 Morgans, Austin Healeys, MGs, Lotus Elans, etc.

There are a number of raised banks around the circuit so we were able to watch the racing from different vantage points. On our side of the circuit one

was near Camp Corner (the last corner before the start/finish straight) which saw some interesting braking and overtaking manoeuvres. The other was Tower Corner leading into the chicane known as 'Bobbies' - again some interesting shenanigans going on through those!

Most of us decided to leave after watching an hour of the 2 hour long GT and Sports Car Cup race, mainly to avoid the rush of traffic leaving later. For me it was hood down and a lovely country cruise home via Bradford-on-Avon, Frome and Shepton Mallett. All in all a great day out.

#### A Visit to the Isle of Wight, by John Adams

Two years ago, I met Rob Davies, who had organized a Folkmog tour to Dorset, and I helped them with some of the activities. Early this year, he mentioned a trip they were doing to the Isle of Wight with the newly formed Mogfriends, which seemed like a good idea, so I signed up.

Of course, as we all know, the weather is always perfect in early September, and the Isle of Wight should have been no exception, right? Setting off in Dorset rain, the hood never came off. The other participants came from Norfolk and Suffolk and had a much worse time, driving through thunderstorms on the M25 to reach the Isle of Wight ferry. Fortunately, despite several CX wipers flying off, and a valiant effort by Frank, driving a beautiful polished aluminium-bodied 3-wheeler (no wipers or hood), everyone made it.



Although expensive, the Wightlink ferry was excellent, with a very helpful crew.

The first drive was right across the island from Lymington to Shanklin and our hotel, the Bourne Hall. By the end of the week, we all thought it was a bit 'Fawlty Towers', which added some humour to the stay, and one couldn't fault the extremely helpful and friendly staff. I must say that wherever lunch was taken, the food was excellent, and Isle of Wight portions are generally 'large'!

A very well-researched and comprehensive itinerary had been devised by Rob and co-organizer Ian Peachey, allowing everyone to pick and choose from the list. Personally, it was all the big things: Osborne House, a private guided tour of Bembridge Fort, Isle of Wight steam railway, MS Waverley paddle steamer trip, Quarr Abbey, a Roman Villa (absolutely outstanding), Nunwell House, and scenic tours on some lovely roads.



Most of us had booked a 4-hour trip once around the Island on MS Waverley, the world's last seagoing paddle steamer, but due to strong winds, the Captain could not risk going around the Needles and to the south, so we steamed up and down the Solent, which was still very enjoyable. A wonderful ship and well worth an excursion if you get the chance. In fact, the weather was so bad that the passengers the Waverley first picked up in Poole were told they had to be dropped off in Southampton and bussed back to Poole!



Fortunately, the rain became intermittent as the week went on, and it didn't really matter as most of the attractions were inside, although just like the mainland, quite a lot of roads were closed due to flooding.

The last two days were beautifully sunny, though it bucketed down with rain and hail on the way back just before reaching home! All in all, it was a great trip in wonderful company, and if you have never been or it's a long time since you have, I can thoroughly recommend a week on the Isle of Wight, but probably avoid the school holidays.

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#### Llanerchindda 2024

After 24 of us had a good time at Llanerchindda in September 2023, a reservation was made for 30 September 2024.

Individual bookings with Llanerchindda Farm were made, including some available remaining places taken by Fossilmog, Spotmog, and Mendip.

As the summer of 2024 came, and had more than its share of what the Met Office calls unsettled weather, we became slightly concerned that the sunny days and balmy evenings were not guaranteed in the Brecon Beacons in early October. Much of September 2024 was not so good weather-wise. In the week before we were due to arrive, the weather was bad on quite a lot of days. Both Spotmog couples had to cancel, one due to both contracting a rather horrible strain of Covid, and one where the lady was playing golf in wet weather, slipped, and twisted her leg, such that she could not even get into a Morgan. The omens were not good!

#### However:

Our day of departure arrived. Overcast but not raining. Hood down? – OK! We had a relatively uneventful trip, arriving at Llanerchindda about 4:30, just in time for afternoon tea with the few early birds, as the remaining participants arrived. Good news this year was that there is now covered parking for 8 cars. We went to our rooms, unpacked, and looked at the maps and route diagrams for the next 2 days.

Following a 3-course evening meal, a good night's sleep, and a good breakfast, we assembled for a briefing, and later for photographs.

Martin, our host, started the morning briefing by congratulating us for being one of the relatively few car clubs to arrive all in cars of the club marque! This is actually far from usual. Following the briefing, which included recommendations for morning coffee, E5 fuel availability, and pointing out some highlights from the route diagrams, we set off towards the Elan Valley (coffee), and on to Devil's Bridge Falls for lunch. The morning included some quite spectacular roads along the valleys and over the hills, often through woodlands.

Fortified by lunch, we set off on the return route, firstly through fields and woodland, and the sun came out as we drove through Tregaron to some higher, quite bleak roads, taking us past a very remote red telephone box, which is probably a couple of miles from the nearest house. From there we drove down the valley past Llyn Brianne Reservoir, returning to Llanerchindda from the

west along a couple of miles of very narrow, very steep (in places) roads, with a few potholes to keep the journey interesting.

Afternoon tea was waiting for us when we arrived, which was enjoyed while we exchanged tales of our day's trip and its highlights, before we got ready for another delightful dinner. This would be easy to get used to!

Wednesday dawned, with a cool but bright welcome to the day, as we studied the route map and directions for our trip to Pendine on the south coast, just a few miles east of Tenby.

This time, after the briefing, we turned right out of the car park up the hill, retracing our return route from Tuesday – with Andrew (or was it Mark) stationed a mile up the road, to avoid passing difficulties in case of oncoming traffic.





A few miles down the road, today more rolling hills than high-roads, our route was blocked for road works. However, we spied another Morgan a couple of hundred metres along a road on the right, and soon we were part of a Morgan trio, looking at the OS map trying to find a way back onto the designated route. By good navigation or good luck by our leader, we came back to the B4310, which was on our tulip diagram. Back on good "B" roads we headed in sunshine, down the A40 for coffee at the Carmarthen Museum. Revived by caffeine, we dropped back onto the A40, Carmarthen by-pass and then on to St Clears, and finally down B roads again to the Pendine Museum of Speed, where, after being met by Mark (or was it Andrew), we lunched overlooking the sea.

We all found the museum fascinating, telling the story of 4 and 2-wheel speed record attempts in the 1920s, and although something of "a stunt," even an attempt in 2015 to break the 1927 record! "Star of the show" when we visited

was BABS, which was rescued from the sands and restored. Babs broke the record with 170 mph in April 1926, which was beaten in Feb 1927 by Malcolm Campbell with an early "Bluebird" with 174 mph. The (apparently road-going) Bentley Continental in 2015 averaged 180 mph over two, 1-mile runs (in opposite directions). However, in addition to these highlights, the museum has a lot of other really good information and exhibits.

We left in sunshine for our journey home to Llanerchindda, driving through Laugharne, where some of us took the opportunity to locate and visit Dylan Thomas's Boathouse. Thereafter, the tulips took us along a parallel B road to the main A40, through Llandovery, where some light rain began to threaten, and finally about a mile before our destination some light rain fell. However, as there was nowhere to stop and raise the hood, we completed our third day without putting the hood up.

After another excellent day's run, afternoon tea, and the final dinner, our hosts rounded the evening off by presenting John R with a birthday cake, which we all shared with him to celebrate his 80th birthday, 2 days after he left Llanerchindda.

All of a sudden it was Thursday! Time to go home. After three great days, excellent food, interesting roads, and even the weather, considering the days immediately before and after, was better than we might have dared to hope, and of course, wonderful company, thanks to: Elaine and John, Elaine and George, Jenny and Bob, Chris and Gordon, Bev and Alan of Wessex, our new friends Alex and Nick of Mendip, and Kim, Graham, and Douglas of Fossilmog.



#### Our Trip to the Isle of Man

#### or as our new car sticker says 'An Adventure Before Dementia'

As part of Neville's 80<sup>th</sup> birthday celebrations (which have gone on almost as long as Frank Sinatra's retirement concerts) we decided it would be good to take part in the British Sports Car Meeting run by Scenic Tours to the Isle of Man; thus giving us an opportunity to see if we could achieve our ambition of getting Bluebell to run at 100 mph.

We drove to the ferry via the 'pretty route' – up the Wye Valley and A49, with glorious sunshine all the way. We stayed en route with our friends Dave & Sue Sapp (Wessex members for years before moving to North Wales) catching up on all our news before continuing on to Heysham. There we were pleased to see lots of other Morgans as well as other well known marques such as MG, Jaguar, Triumph, Austin Healey etc. We were all thrilled to be hoods down but there was some ribbing of a few Triumph Stag owners who were still sheltering under their lids. (They soon took them down!) A totally flat crossing followed (thank goodness) and we were shortly disembarking at Douglas where we quickly drove to our very nice hotel on the front.



There were many activities organised for those that wanted to be kept on the go all the time, but we had previously decided to keep two days free to do our own thing, so the following day we drove to Laxey to visit the famous water wheel, called Lady Isabella which is shortly to finish a complete restoration. This involves replacing all the missing 17 sections of a wooden pump rod which are carried horizontally on a viaduct connecting the wheel via a rocking arm to a rod which works vertically to pump water out of the mine. This working wheel has the largest diameter (72'6" in the world). There are 95 steep steps to climb up to the top and I did have a few moments doubt as to whether it was wise to attempt this, but soon decided to forget my advancing years and have a go. Suffice it to say I was puffing a bit on reaching the top but the views

were well worth the effort, so we decided that after a bite of lunch we would treat ourselves to an easy ride on the mountain railway up to the summit of Snaefell. As I mentioned the weather was glorious so we were able to enjoy the rare sight of being able to view all of the UK from the top — England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales. The views were spectacular and apparently there are only a very few occasions each year when this is possible because of the frequent low cloud/mist.

The following day (still lovely sunshine) we visited Milnthorpe Gardens and whilst I admired the flowers I discovered some old vintage cars kept there (Nev was in his element). The afternoon was spent track racing which was fun and this took Nev back in time to his more youthful days - it was good to find he hadn't lost the knack of throwing the car into the corners. Of course we didn't do very fast times against some of the other cars with seriously big engines and obviously hours and hours of practice, but it was fun even though we had to wear enormous crash helmets which made us look like spacemen.

On Saturday we had another free day so we drove to Peel and by this time it was a bit cloudy and cool, still dry but we were hearing of atrocious weather down South, so we said a little prayer that it wouldn't move our way up North. Then we were taken in batches of about 25 cars of similar speed capacity and let loose to drive as fast as we could (or wanted to) round the TT race track; which is just the ordinary mountain road but with nothing coming the other way and no real restrictions. We (and everyone else)

had to slow down considerably at the top as the thick mist made speedy progress impossible, but this only lasted for about 5 minutes and then we dropped down into clear conditions. It was then that we were able to achieve a bucket list dream of getting Bluebell up to 100 mph. I was hanging on for grim death because the road surface wasn't all that good and the poor old car was really shaking as we dropped down to Creg-Ny-Baa for a lovely tea. However we were jubilant that Nev had managed to accomplish something we had dreamt of doing for the last 20 years! After it was all over Jann Robinson (MSCC Chair) came over very enthusiastically and took the photo shown below which she proceeded to put on Instagram with comments - fame at last!

As this was our final day we joined a huge crowd that evening for a Gala Dinner at a large hotel and to which we were all transported door to door in buses. We met up with our friends Olivia & Ian Denson who were with the TinMog crowd and who had kindly invited us to share a table. This was a super event where we all dressed up and after an excellent meal we were amongst the first up on the dance floor, trying to forget our advancing years.

There was one last thing to make us very aware we were in a Morgan (or in fact any open sports car). As the ferry approached Heysham it started to rain for the first time during our whole trip and we all realised our cars were all hoods down. There was a frantic scrambling by many to take up position at the front of the queue near the appropriate stairs for your car, and then immediately the operatives opened the doors it was a sprint to your vehicle and who could get the hood up the fastest before the ferry doors were opened for the off. I think everyone managed it, but it was rather comical.

We really enjoyed this trip, the organisation was superb and as I have said the weather was really good the whole time (which for us is a rarity) but most important of all we achieved our ambition and Bluebell flew at 100 miles an hour. Well done old girl - not bad for 42 years old 4/4.
